We would like to thank everyone who supported the Macmillan Coffee Morning during September. Thanks to your kind support and generosity we were able to send a donation of £783 to Macmillan, which is a fantastic effort – a very big thank you from us all.

Update from Elmore Church

As most Elmore residents are aware, we are busy fund raising to install toilet facilities at Elmore Parish Church. The increased number of weddings this year and the inevitable fact that none of us are getting any younger has made this a real necessity.

A little while ago someone from the village made the comment that we should be able to afford it with all the wedding fees coming our way; sadly this isn't actually true.

Amazingly only a very small amount of the fees paid to the Church for weddings stay in Elmore. The diocese of Gloucester top cuts just over £180 as a levy towards the cost of providing a Vicar to conduct the marriage. Also the fees payable for bell ringers, organist and verger go straight to those individuals. Roughly £250 per wedding arrives in the PCC account and even that is not all profit since, like everyone else, we have fuel bills to pay as well as insurance and depreciation costs to take into account.

This is why we have approached the Gloucestershire Environmental Trust for grant aid of £10,000 and have also very gratefully received a gift from Elmore Court which amounts to roughly half of the architect's fees. The Gloucestershire Historic Churches Trust will provide £4000 and our recent 700th anniversary celebrations were also a great help in this regard. Other income sources are currently being investigated.

Believe it or not, to complete this project, we have to raise about £38,000 (excluding VAT) of which about two thirds has, in principle, already been found. The final one third will be raised by further grant application and local fund raising.

The fact that our Church is a listed building means that exacting specifications push up the price and a great deal of work has been done to ensure that the most economical yet practical and appropriate design has

been chosen. We have taken in hand extension of the water main, installing a cost effective sewage disposal system and making changes to the vestry area as a result of the internal works; including improved lighting, new carpeting and incorporation of an existing wooden screen.

May I thank everyone for their support in making this project a reality especially the small band of volunteers who are directing the planning and the ongoing fund raising associated with it.

Rubbish!

Many of you will have seen the announcement in the Stroud District Council Newsletter (SDC News) which highlighted the changes to our rubbish collection system but it is worth repeating the details here:

<u>Bulk Rubbish</u>. Up to now SDC have not raised any charges for the collection of bulky items like mattresses, fridges, furniture etc. However this has now been changed and with immediate effect there will be a charge of £15 for the collection of up to 3 items with a charge of £5 for each item over this quantity. <u>Food Waste</u>: During 2016 weekly food waste collections are to be introduced. Sealed food containers and kitchen food caddies will be provided. No date has yet been set for when this will start.

<u>Black Bags</u>: In conjunction with the introduction of food waste collections, the collection of black rubbish bags will change from weekly to fortnightly. This is because SDC has analysed the contents of rubbish bags and found that up to 60% of it is food waste. In addition, black bags themselves will be phased out and a new black wheelie bin provided.

Garden Waste: An optional garden waste scheme will also be introduced during 2016 but householders will have to pay for this service which will cost £36 a year plus a one-off charge of £20 to purchase a special wheelie bin.

<u>Recycling:</u> The current system of recycling of cans, bottles and paper will continue as normal.

The Parish Council raised concerns with SDC about the possible increase in fly-tipping as a result of the new bulk rubbish charges but has been assured that there is no evidence to support this fear based on the experience of all the other local authorities which have introduced the charges throughout the UK.

The Javelin Park Incinerator

The debate about the Javelin Park Incinerator has been one of the hot topics in Gloucestershire for the last few years but now the scheme has been approved and the construction of the rubbish incinerator at Javelin Park is due to start in 2016 and will finish in 2019.

The cost of the project is estimated to be £500million and should divert up to 92% of the current waste from landfill sites. The site will also generate enough power for 26,000 homes

Local Elections

On 5th May 2016 local elections will be held for the district, parish and town councils. These will include Elmore Parish Council.

If you would like to serve the community as a councillor then you will need to stand for election by registering your name with Stroud District Council. The election on 5th May 2016 includes all the current Elmore Parish Council seats and all the current Parish Councillors will be required to either stand for reelection of step down.

If no more than 5 candidates are registered with SDC then all those who put their names forward would be deemed as having been elected. If there are more than 5 candidates then a formal election paper will be produced and an election carried out in the normal way.

Broadband Update:

You may have noticed that the a new, very tall, telegraph pole has appeared on the roadside as you approach the Pilot Pub from the village. At the top of this pole is a dish which will receive and send the super-fast broadband signal from the Hardwicke Telephone Exchange.

The introduction of super-fast broadband into rural areas has been a Government pledge for some time and the target date is the end of 2015 - a deadline that is fast approaching! Your Parish Council has been campaigning for this improvement for many years and we are about to see the fruits of our labours. We have been assured that the new system will be operational by the end of October and that householders can then place orders with their service provider – be that BT, Talk Talk, Virgin or whoever. Of course the provision of a superfast broadband connection may well cost householders more than they are currently paying but no figures have yet been published.

However, a tentative word of warning should be added here – although we will all probably see an improvement in our ordinary Broadband download

speeds without paying anything extra, the idea that we'll get superfast Broadband may some way off as the fibre-optic cables haven't yet been laid into Elmore from the junction box adjacent to the new pole. This is due to happen during the early part of 2016 and then only as far as the Village Hall (EVH). However, households which are within 1.5km west of the EVH should be able to receive a much improved broadband speed.

Fastershire, the organisation responsible for the introduction of superfast broadband to rural areas, has assured us that regular updates appear on their website and that householders can register for automatic updates as to progress. However, this has not been our experience to date. \odot

We will therefore endeavour to keep up-to-date with progress via email as and when we find out ourselves.

Automation of the Canal Bridges

The Canal and Rivers Trust (C&RT) are proposing to automate the canal bridges so that boat users can open the bridges using an app on a smartphone or tablet. The cost of the scheme is estimated to be £4.5 million and should save £500k on staff costs annually. C&RT carried out a public consultation earlier this year to gauge the reaction to their proposals and have since published their findings. It would appear that 63% of all road users and 25% of boat users oppose the new scheme but C&RT and still planning to go ahead with it in its current form.

Your Parish Council and all the other parish councils west of the canal are very concerned that the C&RT proposals do not consider the needs of the residents and favour those boat users who are using the canal for leisure purposes. We are concerned that individual boat users can cause undue delays to traffic as the scheme will be totally automated with no staff manning the bridges and only one boat permitted to pass at a time. In theory this could mean that a queue of boats will open an close the bridges continually without regard to the road users. We are especially concerned about the use of the bridges by the emergency services and any delay that might be imposed on them.

Therefore, a task group has been set up by the Severn Voice Group of parishes in order to persuade Gloucestershire County Council to impose restrictions on the number of times per hour that the bridges can be opened and to encourage C&RT to install CCTV cameras in such a way that they will monitor the traffic on the approaches to the bridges.

The Task Group has prepared a paper highlighting our concerns and submitted it to GCC, our local MP and C&RT.

Personal Security

Although the level of crime in our area has been very low recently we should beware of becoming complacent about our own security.

The darker evenings and longer nights provide an ideal cover for burglars. Therefore, we should all remain vigilant and report any suspicious activity or unmarked vehicles behaving oddly.

It is always a good idea to have timer operated lights in the house, especially when you are away and to keep your neighbours informed about your holidays.

Gloucestershire Police are now using the Elmore roads for driver training so we should see an increased number of police vehicles driving around. This can only be a good thing and provides and added deterrent for those up to no good!

Parish Website

Sadly our Parish website has been 'hacked' and consequently crashed. We are in the process of rebuilding it using a local website designer. Luckily as part of the Government's 'Transparency' initiative, grants are available for setting up websites and we have put in an application. Hopefully we should have the new website up and running before Christmas.

Farming Notes

Agriculture remains at the heart of our community and, as at this time last year, I was keen to get a farming report into **The Bridge.** This year I am grateful to Sophie Round for her contibution. THJ.

Elmore Back Farm

We own 420 acres at Elmore back, Church Farm & Patterills, Longney, and we rent approx 60 at the Weir. We also grow 50 acres of maize on Graham Littleton's land. We mainly have a grass/maize rotation, having grown 260 acres of maize this year and 25 of lucerne. There's also approx 50 acres of permanent pasture for grazing. I'm fortunate that my parents farm in Hartpury, so sometimes they grow maize for me, if

it works with their rotation. They need our muck, which I have lots of, and I need lots of their straw!

It's been a team effort this morning, getting the maize clamp sheeted up, (something no one enjoys) but a good job ensures the crop is sealed in, therefore providing quality forage for the next year. The maize harvest is a couple of weeks behind this year, due to a summer with no great lengths of prolonged sunshine. It's now a race to get the grass seed in ready for next May's silage before the winter sets in, and so the cycle goes on.

Each of the 350 cows we milk has gone through a cycle herself: she's calved, her calf has to be reared, is itself served (put in calf) and then calves down at 24 months old after a 9 month gestation. Each cow is milked for 305 days and within 80 days of calving she has to be in calf again. After these 305 days of milking the cows are dried off for 8 weeks before calving again. Well, that's in an ideal world! But, thrown in along the way can be problems, fertility issues, inconsistent forage quality and the weather to name a few, which affect milk quality & volume.

One problem we hadn't experienced before is a disease called Neospora, we had a massive breakdown two years ago which caused a number of the cows to abort which obviously had a knock-on effect nine months later to our calving pattern, of one calf per day, which enables us to supply a constant level of milk. Neospora is normally caused by dog faeces in crops which when harvested contaminate the feed, so I urge anyone with dogs to clear up after them when out walking.

We are busy now preparing sheds in order to house 650 head of cattle as soon as the weather breaks, there is still plenty of hedge cutting, muckspreading, fencing, worming and vaccinating to do and the list goes on. Even on Christmas Day there are still three milking's to be done!

We aim to have happy healthy cows which in turn hopefully produce a lot of milk, within the strict welfare & hygiene standards set out by our customer & I'm very grateful to the fantastic team who are involved here & make it happen, even when it's cold, wet, there's a power cut & the tractor won't start!!

New plans for Elmore Court

At the beginning of 2017 we are going to be closing for 2 months in order to action the next stage. I've always wanted us to be able to have all of our kitchen facilities in house so that chefs and catering managers can work more closely with our already existing wedding coordinators... It would give us control over our produce and we can start to work with local suppliers and even look at using estate land to grow food, moving us further down the line to becoming self sufficient in both food and energy.

In order for this to happen we are planning a new building in the space between the rear of the main house and the Gillyflower. This would be a large 200 square metre commercial building clad in larch and topped with a living roof to tie in with the look of the Gillyflower.

The existing and nearly derelict Victorian kitchens we would also renovated and they would serve as offices for the additional staff as well as a tasting room for our clients.

Sarah and I are going to be moving out of Elmore. Very sadly we have found it rather hard to live in the middle of such an otherwise successful and busy business and so have had to accept that for now Elmore Court cannot be our home. Our kids are beginning to get to a more inquisitive age and that we can also foresee being problematic! We're not going far but doing so will also enable us to create a fair amount more accommodation that would make Elmore Court even more attractive and viable.

We are drawing up plans right now for submission for planning permission and have already had a meeting with members of Elmore Parish Council who were very supportive. It's all very exciting and we hope that with this development in place, Elmore Court will not only be an award winning wedding venue but also become known for its delicious food and a truly ecological 'field to fork' culture.

At this stage we'd welcome any thoughts or hear any concerns that the parish might have.

Defibrillators: the latest

You will have seen that the second defibrillator has now been installed in the old phone box by the Village Hall. This was paid for largely by your own generous donations. Our appeal raised £1630 including £300

from the Elmore Land Charity. This is a brilliant effort and I know that John Field, Chair of the Parish Council, has written to all who gave so freely to the appeal. There were quite a few anonymous donations so this is our opportunity to thank you too

A defibrillator and its cabinet costs £1950 but the Parish Council can reclaim the VAT so the money you have contributed just about pays for the 2nd machine. There is a relatively small cost in getting the electricity connected; this keeps the cabinet warm and prevents the pads freezing in frosty weather. The costs of this has been met by Elmore Parish Council.

There are now some 35 people in the village who are trained to use the Defib although to use it successfully no formal training is needed; the machine tells you what to do.

Don't forget, whether you are trained or not, FIRST PHONE 999 and give your location. The operator will then tell you the code to get into the cabinet.

Defibrillator Training Session

More than 25 people attended the session on 27th October in the Village Hall. Visiting trainer Martin Fagan from the Community Heartbeat Trust was the speaker. The biggest message was that 'WE CAN DO NO HARM' by helping someone who has collapsed. How the heart works was explained in a fun way.

STARTING AND KEEPING UP CHEST COMPRESSIONS to get the heart pumping until Defibrillator and Ambulance help arrives was stressed. All who attended were given a leaflet with the DRSABCD ('doctors ABCD') mnemonic to remind you what to do and we include one with this issue of **The Bridge** so every household has one.

V.E.T.S. - Village Emergency Telephone System

A third of all 999 calls are from lone rescuers, so getting help to them quickly is important. VETS_is a community run system, and enables up to 10 volunteer neighbours to be called to assist pending the arrival of the emergency services. Houses whose closest defibrillator is at the Elmore Village Phone Box Defibrillator and the houses closest to the

Elmore Back Defibrillator will each have one simple memorable phone number to call for help after the first 999 call. VETS will relay the message on to any of the 10 volunteer helpers. The helpers can then collect and bring the defibrillator to the patient to assist.

When we have enough volunteer names we will run a short training session with the visiting trainer, Martin Fagan, so that we can get the system working.
