# **More Elmore Field Names**

Nothing has stirred up as much interest in the short history of **The Bridge** as our field names. I am grateful to Helen James, Chris Camm, Jim Camm and Carol Guilding for getting in touch with me giving further information.

#### **The Football Ground**

In the November 2017 issue of **The Bridge** I passed on Helen's request for the story behind one of the fields at Hollow Farm known as *The Football Ground*. Chris Camm has filled in the details. Yes, the field was used for both cricket and football from the early 60s until 1968. 'Friendly' games of cricket were played but football was taken rather more seriously and **Elmore United** played in the Stroud League. Early on the players changed at the War Department site (now Graham Taylor's nissan huts) but later there was a club house and changing rooms. Chris has even provided the names of some of the players. The Captain was Dan Taylor, the goalkeeper, Bill Taylor. Some of the other players were Mick Taylor, Graham Taylor, John Base, Mick Newcombe, Gary Conrad and Chris Camm (when he wasn't milking).

I wonder if there are any photographs? It would be great to see them.

At Hollow Farm there is also *The Caravan Ground*. Apparently there was a caravan there but it burnt down when drying clothes were left too close to a heater. The chassis was then converted into a hay trailer though it was then discovered to be a World War One gun carriage.

Receipt of a card from Jim Camm shed more light on Elmore's sporting heritage. Jim and Chris' father bought Hollow Farm in July 1954 and then 'let loose Stan Smith on blowing out tree stumps' (with explosives?) 'and straightening out ditches'. Jim helped to clear the debris and so the ground was prepared for football and cricket. The ground was let to the football club in return for 'bale bumping'. Jim reports that most of the helpers with the bales were 'useless'. He reports that the football club did quite well and that cricket was taken seriously, Micky Taylor helping to roll the pitch.

#### Lake Street Farm

A present day map of Lake Street Farm was provided by Carol Guilding. When I was given a similar map of Barhouse Farm it was possible roughly to equate fields and their names with those on the 1841 map. This has proved very difficult with Lake Street Farm, so much more seems to have changed. Very few of the fields seem to have the same boundaries as they did on the 1841 map but, though the fields look different, some to the names are recognisable. Modern *Housteds* must be related to the 1841 'Hosteads' while *Wovelands* perhaps finds its origin in the 1841 field 'The Wavilands'. It needs a greater shift to get *Dinney* from the 1841 'Dineware' whilst it is easy to see that *Westlands* comes from the 1841 'Westlands Ground'.

*Waite Orchard* and *Joker's Meadow* were bought from Joker Bennett of Elmore Back in the 1960s. *Parish Ground* and *Mick's Meadow* are rented from Elmore Land Trustees but neither of these names has any equivalent on the 1841 map. My own favourite at Lake Street is *West Indies* so called because it's a long way from the farmhouse.

# Graham Littleton's Memories of the 1947 Flood

On reading the February 2017 edition of **The Bridge** I noted that Vera Smith had reached the great age of 103. I also reminded me that 70 years had passed since that momentous winter for 1947. My memories

are scant; I was only 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> years old. However, I do remember there being lots of snow, my mother taking me to visit my Grandfather at Bridgmacote Farm and paddling in flood water in the kitchen.

Then, about ten years ago, when I was a District Councillor, I was involved in a flooding project through the University of Gloucestershire covering flood events in the Severn Vale. The University needed to talk to people who had personal experience and knowledge. I remember saying I knew just the person who would have a graphic account of what happened in Elmore Back and Elmore in 1947. I arranged for Bob Smith to bring his mother Vera to my home to meet the team from the University. They placed a microphone on the table and got her talking. That evening I learnt much myself about the 1947 flood which added to what I had also been told over the years by Paul Round of Elmore Back Farm.

It did not start snowing until January 21st 1947 but from then on there was a tremendous amount of snowfall which lasted until mid March when the thaw finally came coupled with a huge amount of rainfall falling onto frozen ground which made a flood inevitable.

The flood water reached the top of the flood defences at Elmore Back to a level thankfully never seen since. The defences were eventually overtopped as a breach formed just above Graham Lovell's Severn Bank Farm. Vera told us that the Elmore Back basin filled with water over a three week period being topped up deeper and deeper each high tide which swilled more and more water onto the land. In those days the Inland Drainage Board (IDB) did exist but had no pumps; these were only installed in 1959. So the water could not be pumped out. Instead the IDB could only open sluices by hand at low water to allow the flood to go back into the river but the sluices had to be shut again as the tide returned so getting rid of the water was a very slow process.

The farmland and houses at Elmore Back were flooded and the residents had to leave, the farmers taking their livestock with them. Elmore Farm was also flooded. Vera Smith told us that she and her family were the last to leave, with her husband Jacky taking her out in a rowing boat. When passing apple and plum trees they were able to capture rabbits from the treetops, knock them on the head for the pot. It is important to remember that this was the time of severe post war rationing and so rabbit meat helped with the meagre rations.


