I received the following advice sheet which I think is worth reprinting here.

Stay Safe and help prevent the spread of Covid-19

If you haven't already done so, get your booster vaccination, it will help protect you and others from Covid-19 - delta, as well as the new highly transmissible omicron variant.

Follow the latest government guidelines at www.gov.uk/coronavirus.

Take simple actions ...

Wash your hands for 20 seconds *frequently*, Cover your face in enclosed spaces, Make space – where possible, stay two metres apart. Ventilate - let fresh air in if you meet indoors. Work from home if you can.

<u>Get a PCR test if you have symptoms ...</u> Omicron is more likely to start with a headache, runny nose and sore throat. Delta with a high temperature, new continuous cough, loss or change to your sense of smell or taste.

<u>Self-test at home – if you don't have symptoms</u> (1 in 3 people with Covid have no symptoms, but can still spread the virus). Lateral flow testing kits are free and easy to use. You can order at <u>www.gov.uk/order-coronavirus-rapid-lateral-flow-tests</u>. Take a test *shortly* before you meet with others.

Self-isolate at home for 5 days if you test positive (recently reduced from 7).

Get vaccinated – two doses, plus the booster. It's safe and effective.

Footpaths – The project to improve the signage on the village footpaths is continuing. If you do have any views on specific places where improvements are required, please let Dorie Jones (elmore.parish@hotmail.co.uk) know.

Grit Bins – I hope you have spotted the 5 new yellow grit bins around the village? Please feel free to spread some grit, using the enclosed shovel, onto the road when you think it needs some. As the bins are located at potentially hazardous locations (on inclines or at bends in the road) please ensure you stay safe and consider other road users when doing so. Think about your footing/location and where it is safe to park your car if you arrived in one. Also please let us know if the stocks of grit within the bins are getting low.

Litter – You may remember we planned to carry out a litter bin trial at the layby at the Stonebench end of the village, to see if people would use one if provided. This trial was unfortunately cut very short. I installed the black plastic bin in the layby on Sunday 5th December and someone had pinched it by midday Tuesday. It's amazing what some people will take home with them. They did leave the bin bag and the bricks I weighted it down with though. I will have another attempt, but this time try to fix the bin down more securely.

There have been two occurrences over the last few months, where a large quantity of black bin bags, containing soil/vegetation, have been randomly dumped at night along the road/verges within the village. We suspect the same person is responsible for dumping the bags, probably

out the back of a moving vehicle. The authorities have been made aware of this, but please keep your eyes peeled for suspicious behaviour.

Defibrillator Box – The old telephone box outside the Village Hall, where the Elmore defibrillator is stored, is currently being painted.

The Temptation of Gracie by Santa Montefiore

Advanced Nurse Practitioners

We are pleased to say that we have a couple of Advanced Nurse Practitioners working with us this year. These healthcare professionals are extremely qualified and experienced and work in other GP practices in the county to help with urgent, on the day demand. If you ring this year requiring an urgent, same day consultation, you may well speak to an Advanced Nurse Practitioner.

Appointment lengths for routine appointments

A gentle reminder that routine GP appointments are 10 minutes long. A lot of consultations take longer than this and our GPs do their best to accommodate this within their working day. You might wonder why we don't just make the appointment time longer? It is something we are exploring but we have to balance the duration of an appointment with the necessary reduction in appointments we will be able to offer, thus increasing waiting times for routine appointments. What can patients do to help? If you know you wish to discuss a couple of matters at your routine GP appointment, please ask reception to book you a double appointment. This will give you and the GP longer to go through them. However, 5 or 6 matters or concerns will, most likely, require several appointments.

17th – 22nd January- Cervical Cancer Awareness Week

It is important to attend for your smear when you are called. Smears are recommended every 3 years for women aged 25- 49 and every 5 years for women aged 50-64. Cervical smears are no longer required for those

who have had a total hysterectomy to remove your womb and cervix and you should stop receiving invitations in this instance.

The NHS website says to see your GP if you are worried about symptoms of cervical cancer such as unusual bleeding and discharge. Do not wait for your next cervical screening appointment. Visit https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/cervical-screening/what-happens-at-your-appointment, for more information.

It is also Dry January and Veganuary this month.

I read an article this week about how these health campaigns couldn't be more incorrectly timed in the year, given the cold days and dark evenings. However, it is worth starting the New Year thinking about your health and making any lifestyle changes to improve it. Citizens' Advice - Stroud & Cotswold District Don't forget to claim your State Pension!

In years past you would have received your State Retirement Pension automatically. You may not be aware but this is no longer the case, so you will have to claim it to receive it! At Citizens Advice we have been contacted by an increasing number of people who did not realise this.

You should get a letter from the Pension Service no later than 2 months before your 66th birthday (which is the current State Pension Age) telling you what to do to claim your pension. If you do not receive this letter you can still make a claim in the 4 months up to reaching your state pension age.

It is important to claim your State Pension as soon as you can as there may be delays in payment if you leave claiming it too close to your 66th birthday, which could lead to financial difficulties for some people.

How to claim - The quickest way to get your State Pension is to apply online at <u>www.gov.uk/get-state-pension</u> but if you don't have access to the internet you can request a form by calling the Pension Service on 0800 731 7898.

You can check your State Pension age online at <u>www.gov.uk/state-pension-age</u>

Get a forecast of how much money you might get at <u>www.gov.uk/check-state-pension</u>

Some of our clients have experienced delays after claiming which has caused them financial hardship. If you need any help to claim your State Pension or experience problems with claiming, contact one of our friendly advisers at Stroud and Cotswold Citizens Advice.
