

Chair's Annual Statement

At last year's annual meeting I remember sharing some of the details of what was planned to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee within the village. On 2nd June 2022 a large number of residents and family came together on the field next to the church for the Grand Picnic. It was great to see so many people from the village all in one place, having a lovely time on a beautiful sunny day. Commemorative mugs were given to the village children, everyone ate and drank well accompanied by fine music and choirs and the day ended with a lovely big bonfire, what more could you ask for. I would again like to thank everyone who helped in organising/holding, financially supporting and attending the event. It was a great day.

We also planned to plant a commemorative tree, which is now in place and growing well, at the junction to Elmore Back at Farleys End. A plaque marks the tree and seems a fitting tribute after the sad loss of Her Majesty last year.

One other major project we delivered last year was the installation of three Gateway signs on the road entrances into Elmore. We decided that these would provide a greater visual impact that you are entering a proud residential village and hopefully people would drive/ride accordingly.

The last thing I would like to mention happened just over a week ago when the village came together to litter pick as part of the King's Big Help Out. The Parish Council was very happy to support this village event organised by Hamish Pitt. This was a great opportunity for villagers to come together, on the Coronation weekend, have a walk

and do some good for the village at the same time. Over 35 residents collected many bags of rubbish and were rewarded with a hot dog afterwards in the Village Hall. I would like to especially thank Hamish and Dorie for making this happen and all of you who joined in. I believe this type of event will be repeated going forward. With the verges now cut and the new signs installed the village is looking good.

The Parish finances are in good health, despite having a some fairly major expenditures throughout this period mainly due to the Jubilee. The cost of the Jubilee celebrations including the commemorative tree and plaque was offset by some kind donations from individuals/businesses around the village. We also managed to obtain a grant to pay for a large proportion on the new gateway signs. At the end of April our bank balance stood at £6,933.88 and our regular expenditure on insurance, memberships, defibrillator maintenance, printing of The Bridge and the Clerk's salary, have continued throughout the year.

Your Parish Council decided that the Parish Precept should remain unchanged again for this financial year and is currently £2,472. Our internal audit was conducted successfully and we continue to follow the financial transparency guidelines by publishing any expenditure over £100 on our Parish website. We review the financial situation at every Parish Council meeting by producing the financial statement for scrutiny by Councillors and the public.

Finally, I would like to ask newcomers to the village and longer standing residents who may have changed their email address, to let Matt Brandon (matt_brandon@hotmail.com) from the Parish Council know your details. These will be added to our data base and stored securely, only to be used by the council to contact you with regards to important village issues

Our SDC kerb-side recycling bins & other ways to recycle – continued

Following the piece I wrote for the Bridge in February, Iwanted to write a short follow-up piece. Having used the supermarket soft plastic Take Back scheme at Tesco for a few months now, I have

stopped doing so following a report by Bloomberg saying that last year they followed 2 tracking devices they left in bags put into the scheme – one of which ended up in an incinerator in Poland and the other at an industrial estate in Turkey - so not recycled at all. You can find the article on www.everydayplastic.org in Read, Blog, "don't believe the hype". Perhaps it is better after all to put all our soft plastic waste in our bins which will go to the incinerator for safe disposal rather than them washing up somewhere far away? On a more positive note I have met up with the lady who runs a recycling hub in Hardwicke to discuss how she does it. I hope to roll out something similar for the village in due course but am going to trial this first by starting small with just a few items and a few local friends to see how it goes.

I have also been in contact with Brown Owl about the Brownies or Guides doing something environmental to earn a badge such as starting a public drop off point for a Terracycle recycling programme.

Island Book Club - book reviews

The Angel's Game by Carlos Ruiz Zafón

David Martin is a writer of penny dreadfuls who is offered a huge sum of money to write a book for a French publisher. He cannot find any evidence that the publisher actually exists though, and violent things start happening to David's friends and colleagues. A gothic thriller set in the twisting streets of 20th century Barcelona.

Venice by Jan Morris

What a fascinating book ... but not everyone in our book group quite finished it because it is so full of colour, interest and intelligence that it does demand concentration! However it was, and still is thought by many to be THE definitive guide book to Venice, written in 1960 - its origins, its people, its treasures, the best and the worst of this gloriously unique city - which, its author, Jan Morris, was at pains to point out, was not a guide book as written by a "travel writer", but one of her "many books about place, which are nothing to do with movement and journeys, but more about people and history". The forward, written by Morris, of the latest and third edition, revised in 1993, stated, "I soon came to realise that it ... could not be modernised ... with a few deft strokes ..., I changed the details of the book, but hardly touched its generalities".

Just as a fascinating as the book, is Jan Morris's life. Born as a man, James Humphry Morris, in 1926, she published under her birth name until 1972, when she had a sex change. By then, she had already been an intelligence officer in the Army, after which she read English at Oxford, and became a successful journalist and writer. Her Pax Britannica trilogy (a history of the British Empire) and her 'portraits' of Oxford, Trieste, Hong Kong, New York City and our book, Venice, were particularly highly acclaimed. Venice is still prominent on the bookshelves of the High Street today. Morris was a member of the 1953 British Mount Everest expedition which made the first ever confirmed ascent of the mountain. As the only journalist to accompany the expedition, which included Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay, Morris climbed most of the way with the team and sent the news of the successful ascent back to London, via a series of runners, telegrams and mixed messages, to be announced in The Times on the morning of Queen Elizabeth II's coronation on 2nd June 1953. Jan Morris survived her wife, Elizabeth, who she married in 1949 and with whom she had five children, four of whom survived them both. They had to divorce after her gender reassignment surgery, but lived together and were legally reunited in 2008. Morris, a prolific and highly regarded writer, died on 20th November 2020. Jan Morris became somewhat more of a celebrity in recent years, and albeit that she said she recognised from the age of four she had been born into the wrong body, she said "I don't think my writing changed that much, except that perhaps I became a little more relaxed about it. In the IRG, we did wonder if the writing in Venice was a little more in the hand of a man.

ROTARY in the SEVERN VALE

Spring has been a busy time for your local Rotary. While maintaining our regular breakfasts, we've combined community activities and social events with important time with our friends and families.

Speakers at breakfast included Janet Whitaker, previously a producer and director for BBC who regaled us with tales of her long career in radio drama, working with some of the acting greats. It seems that many of them were happy to earn a crust in the day whilst performing in the West End in the evening. As always, some were a delight to work with, others perhaps less so.

Rob Toseland, a Rotary member gave a very interesting presentation about The Schneider Trophy, a prize conceived in 1912 for seaplanes to encourage excellence in aeronautics and to extend the known boundaries of powered flight. Over the 18 years it was held several European countries and the USA participated. The first race in 1913 yielded a winner with a speed of 50mph. Eleven pilots lost their lives and many more were injured in their attempts to break the record. The final race in 1931 was won by the British Supermarine S6B, at over 340mph. Lessons learned designing the S6B helped in devleoping the Spitfire

We welcomed Jenni Hobbs from Barhouse Farm in Elmore. Her family run a dairy farm with some 180 cattle of various breeds. In 2018 they saw the need to diversify and set up 'Wholly Gelato', selling artisan ice cream from the farm using their own whole milk and other local ingredients. This has grown exponentially over the years, winning many awards locally and nationally. The majority of their sales are still via the farm shop, but they also supply a number of local restaurants, wedding venues, Coop shops and Gloucester motorway services amongst others. At the end Jenni gave out generous samples of two flavours which seemed to go down very well too!

Community activities and fundraising included a litter pick along the Perry Way and the Stroll 4 Sunflowers where over 100 people were involved in the walk and enjoyed a return trip from Saul to Gloucester courtesy of Mike Ellis and one of his vintage buses. As we go to print, we're finalising arrangements for Sunday 28 May and this year's Frampton Open Gardens.

We continued to enjoy our work with schools with Youth Speaks at Wycliffe where we listened to Year 7s presentations for the English Speaking Board and being involved in supporting Young Entrepreneur at Severn Vale.
